



#### A WORD ABOUT THE CANDIDATES PAMPHLET . . .

The Secretary of State is required by law to publish a Candidates Pamphlet preceding each state general election. In the preparation of this pamphlet, every nominee for a contested Federal or state office has been given the opportunity to provide a photograph and statement of qualifications.

In past elections, it has been possible to combine the Candidates Pamphlet with the Voters Pamphlet (relating to issues) making a single publication. This year, with a record number of state measures, the size of the Voters Pamphlet (112 pages) created unusual production problems.

It was determined that savings of more than \$125,000.00 could be made by printing a separate Candidates Pamphlet. In addition, the voter is getting two convenient pamphlets instead of one unwieldy over-sized publication of more than 200 pages.

We trust this decision to issue this Candidates Pamphlet as a separate publication will be accepted as in the best interest of the citizens of the State of Washington.

George McGOVERN and R. Sargent SHRIVER

Democratic Party

In this election year, approaching the 200th anniversary of our country, let us look closely at where we have gone over the last four years, and where we will go under a McGovern-Shriver Administration.

The incumbent administration has failed to cope with crucial problems both abroad and at home.

Administration spokesmen tell us they have a plan to end the war in Vietnam. Yet four years after we heard the promise of peace, the Indochina war continues to rage. Administration spokesmen tell us that we should reelect the President. Yet prices and corporate profits continue to rise without evidence of control. Wages are held down, and union contracts are reduced and negated by the Cost of Living Council. Homeowners' taxes go up, and instead of tax reform the Nixon Administration proposes a Value Added Tax, a form of national sales tax.

Many of Washington's leading industries, aircraft and timber for example, have been severely depressed by high interest rates and galloping inflation. As of this June, 137,000 Washington citizens were unemployed, 8.7 per cent of the work force. For the Seattle-Everett area, the rate stood at 10.1 per cent, with 68,700 unemployed. Outside of Alaska, Washington has the highest unemployment rate in the nation. Statewide, as of June, 228,000 Washington citizens were receiving food stamps.

Our nation needs new leadership: policies which will use the national resources to meet the people's needs. The time has come for a reform administration, led by George McGovern and Sargent Shriver.

A Democratic administration will restrain prices, and not just wages. A McGovern-Shriver administration will not permit companies to increase prices more than necessary to offset increased costs.

A Democratic administration will close tax loopholes, reform the federal tax structure to reduce inequities, provide relief for the middle income citizen. It will mean jobs in depressed areas. Americans cannot afford 4 more years of the incumbents. Americans do not want 4 more years of inflation, 4 of high unemployment, 4 of high interest rates.





Richard M. NIXON and Spiro T. AGNEW Republican

Party

When Richard Nixon entered the White House on January 20, 1969, the United States was at one of the lowest points in its history. We were faltering and losing ground. Since that time the President has shown how statesmanship and positive action could reverse those trends.

Every effort has been made to bring peace to Vietnam without sacrificing the South Vietnamese people. 500,000 have been brought home from Vietnam, casualties reduced, spending cut by two-thirds.

The President negotiated agreements with the Soviet Union and initiated improved relations with China. He has sought to relieve tensions in other troubled areas of the world.

The Nixon administration has taken strong action to dampen inflation and increase employment. The President initiated a 90-day wage-price freeze, followed by more flexible controls, and introduced tax cuts to stimulate the economy. The inflation rate has been cut in half and the Gross National Product has expanded under his leadership. To relieve tax burdens at state and local levels, the administration's federal revenue sharing plan has been enacted.

Law enforcement policies of the Nixon-Agnew administration have been successful, with half our major cities having decreased crime.

The Environmental Protection Agency was established to combat threats to our environment. Environmental funds have increased over 500%.

The President's health care proposals are designed to guarantee better medical care for all U.S. citizens and find cures for cancer and sickle cell anemia. The drug abuse menace is being attacked.

Young Americans have been helped by the President's signing into law the bill giving 18-year-olds the right to vote and by his overhaul of the selective service system. Older Americans benefit from the President's proposals which increased Social Security payments by more than one-third.

More women and more minority citizens have been given positions of responsibility than in any previous administration. Positive actions, not empty rhetoric, show the President believes in full participation in our society by all citizens.

Independent Party

John G. Schmitz, Congressman from California, accepted the national American Party nomination at Louisville, Kentucky August 3, 1972. He is carrying on the work of Governor George Wallace, who was unable to continue after the nearly successful attempted assassination. The Independent Party, Washington state affiliate of the National American Party, also nominated Schmitz at its September 19th convention in Seattle. Schmitz pledges he will

"keep sending the message" as Wallace did, to oppose mandatory bussing, gun controls, additional high taxes, inflation (always caused by government spending and taxation), and all the other hair-brain schemes which have become cornerstones in the other two national parties. Congressman Schmitz served for six years in the California Senate, was elected to U.S. Congress and re-elected by the largest vote given that year. Congressman Schmitz summarizes his platform in two essential planks, 1. Foreign Policy, "Never go to war unless you intend to win;" and, 2. Domestic Policy, "Those who work should live better than those who won't." While serving as state senator, Schmitz was chairman of the Local Government Committee. In Congress, he was elected to serve on the major House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, and on the House Internal Security Committee. Tom Anderson, well known agricultural journalist and most quoted humorist with his witty and dynamic speaking abilities, was both the popular nominee and personal choice of presidential candidate, John G. Schmitz. Anderson is a 1934 graduate of Baylor Military Academy and of Vanderbilt U. A Tennessee resident, his long career includes securities business, U.S. Navy officer, magazine publisher and owner, weekly columnist, and winner of many pro-American awards. Through his weekly opinion column, called "Straight Talk," Anderson is unquestionably the most widely quoted editor in the South and the most widely read farm editor in America. He is a past president of the American Agricultural Editors Assn., and holds an honorary doctor of law degree from Bob Jones University.

Capitalism is faced with recurrent crises that have punctuated capitalism's existence intensity.

In these crises society has again and again faced an absurd catastrophe: an epidemic of "overproduction," with millions of workers deprived of their livelihoods because they have produced too much.

The fierce competition in the World's market places has compulsively driven American capitalism to revolutionize technology. Each improvement in the methods or tools of production that increases the workers' productivity also increases the stockpile of goods already in the glutted market.

A total economic collapse is in the capitalist cards. It will blast any remaining illusions workers may have that comfortable, secure lives are possible for them within capitalist society.

The Socialist Labor Party's program calls upon the workers to unite politically and industrially. Political unity will enable the worker majority to demand a democratic mandate for social ownership of industry and production. #### STATEMENT OF PRINCIPLES

We, the members of the Libertarian Party, challenge the cult of the omnipotent state, and defend the rights of the individual. We hold that each individual has the right to exercise sole dominion over his own life, and has the right to live his life in whatever manner he chooses, so long as he does not forcibly interfere with the equal right of others to live their lives in whatever manner they choose. Governments throughout history have regularly op-

erated on the opposite principle, that the state has the right to dispose of the lives of individuals and the fruits of their labor. Even within the United States, all political parties other than our own grant to government the right to regulate the life of the individual and seize the fruits of his labor without his consent. We, on the contrary, deny the right of any government to do these things, and hold that the sole function of government is the protection of the rights of each individual: namely, (1) the right to life—and accordingly we support prohibiting the initiation of physical force against others; (2) the right to liberty of speech and action—and accordingly we oppose all attempts by government to abridge the freedom of speech and press, as well as government censorship in any form; and (3) the right to property—and accordingly we oppose all government interference with private property, such as confiscation, nationalization, and eminent domain, and support laws which prohibit robbery, trespass, fraud and misrepresentation. Since government has only one legitimate function, the protection of individual rights, we oppose all interference by government in the areas of voluntary and contractual relations among individuals. Men should not be forced to sacrifice their lives and property for the benefit of others. They should be left free by government to deal with one another as free traders on a free market; and the resultant economic system, the only one compatible with the protection of man's rights, is laissez faire capitalism. "We the candidates of the Libertarian Party, pledge to uphold the principles of the party, and will hold ourselves accountable for our actions."



Third Congressional District



Julia Butler HANSEN

Democrat 3rd Cong. Dist.

Congresswoman Julia Butler Hansen, dean of the State delegation to the House of Representatives, chairman of the Appropriations Subcommittee on the Dept. of Interior and Related Agencies, has represented the Third Congressional District continuously since 1960.

Mrs. Hansen is the only woman member of Appropriations and is the first woman in congressional history to head an Appropriations Subcommittee, which reviews the funding proposals for programs of the U.S. Forest Service, National Park Service, Bureau of Indian Affairs, Youth Conservation Corps, Bureau of Land Management, Bureau fo Outdoor Recreation, Bureau of Sports Fisheries and

Wildlife, the Smithsonian Institution, National Federation on the Arts and Humanities, and many others.

Mrs. Hansen has volunteered for activities far beyond her heavy workload. She helped organize the prestigious "Democratic Study Group," comprised of the most forward looking progressive House members. She helped draft several significant House reform measures—including the one abolishing the old "seniority" rule for automatically elevating committee members to chairmanships.

The quality and thoroughness with which Mrs. Hansen fulfills her duties were probably best demonstrated during her past term of office. After completing presentation of her appropriations bill, she was given a spontaneous bi-partisan standing ovation by her colleagues—a rare occurrence.

Mrs. Hansen's is the state's largest district, containing all or parts of roughly one-third of the state's counties.

Prior to entering Congress, Mrs. Hansen served 22 years in the state House. She was chairman of the House Education Committee and of the Highways Committee. She headed the Western Interstate Committee on Highway Policy Problems for 11 western states.

Julia Butler Hansen has resided her entire life in the Third District, including the communities of Olympia, Orting and Buckley. She is the descendant of a pioneer family that first moved to Olympia, Washington territory, in 1877. Mrs. Hansen and her husband, Henry, a retired logger, maintain their home at Cathlamet. Mrs. Hansen's mother was a school superintendent; her father a county sheriff. Mrs. Hansen is a graduate of the U. of W.



R. C. (Skip) McCONKEY Republican

3rd Cong. Dist.

I wish to welcome all voters to the new Third Congressional District. To those whom I have not yet had the opportunity of meeting, I am R. C. (Skip) McConkey, a forty year old builder from Olympia, and have lived in the Third Congressional District all of my life.

I would like to remind the voters that ours is a republic of sovereign states under a written constitution. You elect those you wish to represent you in Congress. Therefore, the first concern of any member of Congress should be to protect the interest of all his constituents.

One of the many things which affect all of us is inflation. We (especially those of us on fixed incomes such as the elderly) have been grievously hurt by inflation. Yet so many of us are unaware that inflation is caused by deficit spending (borrowing money instead of cutting spending) for programs which are by and large in defiance of the limitations set by the Constitution.

It seems to me the cure for inflation must lie in curbing deficit spending, and not in wage-price controls. The freezing of wages, salaries and prices cannot stop inflation, but can and does undermine the bargaining power of workers as well as hampering the proper function of the competitive free enterprise system.

Every possible action to restore the Constitution should be taken, and I believe the oath of office taken by every representative to Congress means what it says: "I do solemnly swear to support and defend the Constitution of the United States.

Mike McCORMACK Democrat

Congressman Mike McCormack is this Autumn completing his first two-year term in the U.S. House of Representatives. By any standard, his Freshman term has been an outstanding success. McCormack was appointed to two, rather than one, major committees, both of vital importance to the Fourth Congressional District.

Helped obtain federal assistance for major health care, educational, resource development and environmental protection projects in the state. Vigorous supporter of more meaningful efforts to improve law enforcement and administration of justice. Consistently favored rights of hunters and sportsmen in legitimate use of firearms.

Son of Superior Court Judge and Mrs. Ralph E. Foley, Spokane. Graduate of U. of W. and its School of Law. Former Spokane County Deputy Prosecutor, Assistant State Attorney General and Special Counsel to Senate Interior Committee. Married former Heather Strachan in 1968.

Democrat

Albert D. Rosellini served as Governor of the State from 1957 to 1965. His administration was highlighted by outstanding improvements in programs for juvenile and adult corrections institutions, mental hospitals, schools for the retarded, the deaf and the blind. Our network of highways and bridges flourished. He established the State Department of Commerce and Economic Development and revitalized the State Parks dept. As Governor, Rosellini helped generate the nation's first profit-making World's Fair. During his second term, Rosellini's fellow governors recognized his administrative abilities by electing him chairman of the National Governors' Conference. Since leaving office, Rosellini has remained active in civic and political affairs while maintaining a busy private law practice. During the past year, for instance, he served as Chmn. of the U.S. Olympic Committee for Washington State.

Rosellini accepted the mandate to run again for the state's highest office after countless statewide discussions with residents concerned about the monstrous growth of more expensive and less efficient government in Olympia. Rosellini's candidacy is rooted in a commitment to return fiscal responsibility to State government. During the 1973-75 biennium, he will reduce the cost of run-

ning the state by \$100,000,000. From his 18 years in the State Senate and his experience as Governor, he knows where the deadwood is. He knows how to cut costs without cutting efficiency. The savings will be used to reduce property taxes by 15 to 17 per cent. NOTE: State law reads "Any voter may take with him into the polling place any printed or written memorandum to assist him in marking or preparing his ballot." (RCW 29.51.180)
