WRITTEN TESTIMONY ON HB1697

Early Learning & Human Services Committee Friday, February 11, 2011 John L. O'Brien Building, House Hearing Room D, 1:30 p.m.

Thank you for this opportunity to provide written testimony on House Bill 1697. My name is Mary Meinig and I am the Director of the Office of the Family & Children's Ombudsman.

I support the intent of HB1697 to strengthen oversight of the placement of dependent children through random, unannounced home visits, both for those children residing with a parent in an in-home dependency, as well as for children residing in out-of- home care. Unfortunately, we know that there are bad outcomes regarding the safety and welfare of dependent children in state care. Some of these situations may have been prevented through unannounced home visits which can identify problems or concerns not otherwise apparent through scheduled visits. Perhaps most importantly, foster youth tell us they believe they would be safer if case workers conducted unannounced home visits.

HB1697 appropriately focuses on enhancing the safety and well being of all dependent children in state care, as it applies equally to all caregivers- relatives, kin, foster parents, as well as to parents. This bill only requires unannounced visits for "no less than ten percent" of current caregivers and is therefore not unduly burdensome for the department, supervising agency or caregiver.
