An accelerated re-inventory of WSDOT road crossings using updated protocol was initiated in Water Resource Inventory Area (WRIA) 26. Information from that inventory combined with former efforts indicates there are approximately 2,300 WSDOT-owned fish passage barriers to fix, of which about 400 are on the fish passage database. Inventory of fish passage barriers and inadequately screened irrigation diversions was completed on the WDFW Olympic Wildlife Area, Methow Wildlife Area, and Region 6 Access Areas. Efforts also started in the Cowlitz Wildlife Area. It is estimated that the total number of problems on all WDFW-owned lands will approach 1,000. WDFW fish passage database has been updated with new information from WDFW inventory crews and several 1998 Fish Passage Barrier Inventory grant recipients over the past year. The database currently contains 10,500 records approximately 2,000 are barriers to fix. The database user interface has been modified to reflect assessment protocol refinements, sea-run cutthroat have been added to the priority index model, and components were incorporated to address surface water diversions (screens). In addition, a distributable version of the database has been developed for use by independent barrier inventory groups.
